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1	PROCEEDING
2	DONNA MOYE: Hello and welcome. The time is now 6:30
3	p.m., on Thursday, September 2nd, 2021 and the
4	recording of this public hearing has begun. My
5	name is Donna Moye, and I will serve as your
6	hearing officer tonight.
7	This virtual public hearing is being held by
8	the South Carolina Department of Health and
9	Environmental Control; hereafter referred to as
10	DHEC. The purpose of this hearing is to accept
11	comments and supporting information on the mine
12	operating permit application and draft air permit
13	for the proposed Enoree Quarry.
14	Luck Stone Corporation has submitted
15	applications to DHEC to construct and operate this
16	granite mine at a site located approximately 1.5
17	miles east of Enoree, South Carolina in Spartanburg
18	County. DHEC staff from the Bureau of Land and
19	Waste Management and the Bureau of Air Quality will
20	be giving the presentation tonight. They will
21	introduce themselves and the programs they work in
22	when they begin to speak.
23	We also have behind-the-scenes assistance
24	tonight from our tech team. I'll ask them to
25	introduce themselves now.



1	KRISTY ELLENBERG: Good evening, this is Kristy
2	Ellenberg.
3	KATHERINE YON: Good evening, everyone, this is Katherine
4	Yon.
5	DONNA MOYE: Thank you, Kristy and Katherine. We
6	recognize that participating in a virtual hearing
7	may still be a new experience for many, Kristy and
8	Katherine are here to help things run smoothly.
9	Should we have any technical issues, we appreciate
10	your patience and understanding as they work
11	through those for us.
12	Our tech team will be doing a few things
13	virtually to help prevent distractions and ensure
14	that everyone is heard at the appropriate time.
15	All cameras have been turned off and all lines have
16	been muted to minimize background noise and echoing
17	during the presentation. After the presentation,
18	we will unmute lines and share further instructions
19	so that all who would like to provide comments
20	tonight are able to do so.
21	DHEC has created a webpage for convenient
22	access to information about the proposed mine. As
23	mentioned earlier, that webpage address is
24	scdhec.gov/luckstoneenoree, that is all one word.
25	DHEC's recording of this hearing will be placed on



1	our webpage within the coming week.
2	These proceedings are also being recorded by a
3	certified court reporter who will prepare a written
4	transcript. The transcript will also be posted on
5	our webpage when it is available. If you have not
6	already done so, I encourage each of you to go to
7	our web page and complete the registration form for
8	this hearing. This will let us know how to notify
9	you of DHEC's final decisions.
10	The permitting process at DHEC begins when an
11	application is received for one or more
12	environmental permits. During the permitting
13	process, an applicant must show that his proposed
14	operation can comply with state and federal
15	regulations. These regulations were developed to
16	ensure that human health and the environment are
17	protected. In addition to reviewing the
18	application, DHEC's role is to write, and if
19	issued, enforce permits that meet the requirements
20	of the regulations.
21	You also have a role in DHEC's permitting
22	process. Your comments are important to us and
23	they provide DHEC staff with additional things to
24	consider when making final decisions regarding the



25

proposed mine.

1	Final decisions have not yet been made and
2	will not be made here tonight. The purpose of this
3	hearing is for you to provide comments before final
4 .	decisions are made. Please keep in mind that final
5	decisions are not made based on a vote or how many
6	people say the same thing. DHEC welcomes and
7	encourages all comments made tonight, as well as
8	those submitted in writing through the end of the
9	public comment period on Friday, September 17th,
10	2021.
11	We will now move on to our agenda and the
12	order in which we will proceed for this hearing.
13	An overview of the proposed mine and DHEC's mine
14	permitting process will be provided by Jeremy Eddy.
15	Following Jeremy's presentation, an overview of the
16	draft air permit and DHEC's air permitting process
17	will be provided by Mareesa Singleton.
18	Following the presentation, I will begin the
19	public comment portion by calling on those of you
20	who indicated during pre-registration that you
21	would like to make a comment. If you have decided
22	that you no longer wish to comment when you are
23	called on, you may decline at that time.
24	Once we have finished hearing from all pre-
25	registered speakers, those who did not pre-register

1	to speak will be given an opportunity to make their
2	comments. At that time, I will give instructions
3	on how to indicate that you would like to make a
4	comment from your remote location. After all
5	comments have been heard, I will make closing
6	remarks and this public hearing will be adjourned.
7	In order for everyone to have a fair and equal
8	opportunity to participate tonight and to ensure
9	that we proceed in a timely and effective manner,
10	the following four guidelines have been
11	established.
12	First, there will be no questions or answers
13	during or after a presentation or comment. Second,
14	your comments should not go over four minutes each.
15	At the end of your allotted time, you will hear
16	this sound. (Pause.) Well, you were supposed to
17	hear the sound. We will make sure that whenever
18	your time is up, you will hear
19	KATHERINE YON: Sorry, Donna.
20	DONNA MOYE: That's okay.
21	KATHERINE YON: Hang on; here we go. (Timer sound
22	demonstrated.)
23	DONNA MOYE: Thank you, Katherine. I will interrupt
24	to remind you if you do not conclude your comments
25	at that time. If you are not able to complete your

1	comments within the allotted time, you may still
2	submit them in writing before the end of the public
3	comment period.
4	Our third ground rule is to please be
5	respectful towards all who are presenting
6	information or making comments here tonight. You
7	each have a unique and valued perspective, no one
8	comment is considered more important than another.
9	And fourth, please do not interrupt or ask
10	other participants to respond during your comments.
11	Comments or actions that distract from the purpose
12	of this hearing will not be allowed.
13	I'm sure that you are all tired of hearing me
14	speak at this time, so I will now call on Jeremy
15	Eddy to begin the DHEC presentation. Jeremy?
16	JEREMY EDDY: Thank you, Donna. Can you hear me?
17	DONNA MOYE: I sure can.
18	JEREMY EDDY: Okay, great. Good evening, ladies and
19	gentlemen, and thank you for showing an interest in
20	our mine permitting process. My name is Jeremy
21	Eddy, and I'm the project manager for this Luck
22	Stone Enoree Development Site Quarry Project. I
23	have a bachelor's and master's degree in geology,
24	and am a licensed professional geologist in the
25	State of South Carolina. I have worked in the



1	mining and reclamation section for four and a half
2	years permitting and inspecting mine sites across
3	the state.
4	Tonight, I'd like to go over our process with
5	you, what we have already accomplished, where we
6	currently are, and what we expect for the future,
7	and then speak of the details of the mining
8	application and the proposed reclamation plan.
9	On April 8th, 2021, DHEC received an
10	application from Luck Stone Corporation for the
11	proposed Enoree Development Site Quarry. At that
12	time, we began our administrative review to make
13	sure that we had all relevant information for our
14	initial public notice.
15	On May 13th, 2021, DHEC published the initial
16	public notice by running an ad in the Spartanburg
17	Herald-Journal newspaper and mailing out memos to
18	the adjacent landowners and those that owned land
19	within a half mile of proposed blasting.
20	Additionally, we sent out the application package
21	to other federal state and local agencies for their
22	comments. At this time, we began our technical
23	review of the application package.
24	On August 19th, DHEC held a public meeting to
25	provide information about the application package,



1	which was followed by a question-and-answer period.
2	Tonight, on September 2nd, 2021, DHEC is holding an
3	official public hearing. In addition to the oral
4	comments that we will receive tonight, all
5	subsequent written comments may be delivered to
6	DHEC via mail or email. Contact information will
7	be provided in another slide. We ask that those
8	comments be received by us no later than September
9	17th, 2021 for consideration in our permitting
10	process.
11	Our technical review will continue to ensure
12	that we address as many comments and concerns that
13	the South Carolina Mining Act and regulations will
14	allow. At a time to be determined, if a reason to
15	deny the application has not been discovered, DHEC
16	will make a permitting decision.
17	If the permit is approved, we will include a
18	summary response to comments which will address the
19	comments and concerns that we received throughout
20	the permitting process. This will also begin
21	the 15-day appeal period, and information on how to
22	appeal the decision will be included.
23	If the permit is denied, a letter of denial
24	and reasons for such will be sent to the applicant,
25	which will also begin the appeal period for them to



1	appeal our decision.
2	The permit boundary, outlined in white,
3	contains three tracts of land currently under a
4	purchase agreement with Luck Stone Corporation.
5	This area is mostly undeveloped and totals 542.9
6	acres. Interstate 26 can be seen to the east as
7	indicated by the I-26 symbol. Exit 41 can be seen
8	to the south, to the southeast of the symbol.
9	I-27 or, I'm sorry, I-26 will be the primary
10	avenue of transportation for any non-local haul
11	truck deliveries and is accessed by via Highway 92,
12	less than one mile from the proposed access road.
13	The town of Enoree is approximately one mile as the
14	crow flies in the southwest direction as indicated
15	by the arrow.
16	This is a closeup view of the proposed quarry
17	site. The proposed site is situated between
18	Lawrence Road to the west and Frontier Road and I-
19	26 to the east. Hanna Creek is located to the west
20	and several unnamed tributaries bisect the site.
21	As previously mentioned, this proposed site
22	has a total area of approximately 543 acres.
23	Approximately 105 acres of this site have been
24	categorized as buffer and is denoted by the red
25	overlay. Buffer is defined as land that will not



1	
1	be disturbed beyond the pre-mine natural state.
2	This includes a minimum 50-foot perimeter buffer
3	around the entire permit boundary acting as a
4	visual screen, and minimum 50-foot buffers from any
5	stream channels or wetlands near the affected area.
6	Again, this is area that will remain untouched by
7	mining activities.
8	Approximately 182 acres is categorized as
9	future reserves and is denoted by the yellow
10	overlay. Future reserves are defined as areas that
11	may be affected in the future, but would first
12	require a modification to the permit, including
13	detailed mine and reclamation plans that must be
14	approved by DHEC before any mining activities could
15	commence in these areas. Additional financial
16	assurance for reclamation must also be received by
17	DHEC prior to any mining activities in future
18	reserves. The applicant has indicated that these
19	areas may become overburden storage areas, but only
20	if the need arises. Again, detailed plans are
21	required to be approved by DHEC before any
22	disturbance in these areas.
23	Last but not least, approximately 256 acres of
24	this site have been categorized as affected area
25	and are denoted as areas outlined in various colors



on the map. For simplicity, the buffer and future
reserve overlays have been removed to focus on the
affected areas. Affected area is defined as area
of land from which overburden or minerals have been
removed, or upon which overburden material has been
deposited, or stockpiles and settling ponds
associated with mining activities.

It has been proposed that the two large areas to the east and south, outlined in green, will be used as overburden storage. The area shaded in teal is the proposed pit. The pit will be excavated in three phases with the first phase at the northwest area, and then slowly expanding east then south into phase two and phase three.

The initial plant area is shown in an orange outline and will be maintained throughout phases one and two. When the pit expands into phase three, the plant will be relocated into the purple area to the south, which also holds the office, scale house and maintenance area.

The applicant has stated that the maximum proposed depth for the pit is 560 feet below ground surface. Given the competency of the granite bedrock, the applicant has requested permission to blast at this site and will be required to meet our



1	surface blasting requirements in Regulation 89-150.
2	As part of that, landowners with structures
3	within a half mile of blasting will be offered a
4	pre-blast survey. A pre-blast survey is an
5	inspection performed by a third-party independent
6	contractor that is designed to identify any
7	preexisting structural damage.
8	Copies of this report will be given to the
9	operator, DHEC, and the landowner and can be used
10	to determine if structural damage is caused by
11	blasting. This pre-blast survey is offered at no
12	cost to the landowner. And as previously stated,
13	the applicant may request to conduct mining
14	activities in future reserves, but will require
15	DHEC approval at that time.
16	The operator is required to perform
17	reclamation activities concurrently with mining as
18	feasible. When the mine reaches its end of life,
19	the operator is required to perform final
20	reclamation activities. Reclamation is the process
21	to restore the affected land to a useful purpose
22	while protecting the natural resources of the
23	surrounding area.
24	The applicant has indicated in the reclamation
25	plan that the site will be reclaimed as a pond or



1	lake and grasslands. As previously mentioned, the
2	land will be sloped on a 3:1 gradient as soon as
3	feasible and stockpiled topsoil will be spread out
4	on the top end sides. This will be used to
5	revegetate these areas. The pond or lake shall
6	also meet our minimum reclamation standards
7	detailed in Regulation 89-330.

Financial assurance is required to ensure that reclamation will be completed. This is a financial mechanism such as a surety bond or letter of credit that will cover the cost of reclamation should the operator not meet reclamation standards. In this hypothetical scenario, this financial mechanism will be forfeited and DHEC will use the money to complete reclamation activities.

To reiterate our next steps, DHEC will accept written comments until September 17th, 2021, and will consider these comments in order to continue our technical review of this permit application.

At the conclusion of that technical review,
when all comments have been considered, DHEC will
make a final permitting decision and provide
notification and a summary response to comments to
everyone on our mailing list. Whether the
application is approved or denied, this decision



1	will begin the 15-day appeal period and
2	instructions on how to appeal our decision will be
3	included.
4	Thank you for your time tonight, and I look
5	forward to hearing your comments.
6	Next, we have Mareesa Singleton from the
7	Bureau of Air Quality to speak about the air
8	synthetic construction permit. Mareesa?
9	MAREESA SINGLETON: Good evening, I am Mareesa Singleton
10	with the Bureau of Air Quality. I am the permit
11	writer for the proposed Luck Stone Enoree
12	Development Site. I have a chemical engineering
13	degree and I have been with DHEC for almost 15
14	years. I am Air Quality's project manager for all
15	of its mining facilities.
16	Luck Stone submitted and air construction
17	permit application on April 21st, 2021 for a new
18	granite quarry and processing plant. The proposed
19	plant has a maximum production rate of 550 tons per
20	hour and consists of crushers, screens, and
21	conveyors. The proposed facility is required to
22	obtain an air permit due to the amount of
23	particulate matter emissions, or in this case, dust
24	that it has the potential to generate. Particulate
25	matter or PM may be a mixture of solid particles



and liquid droplets found in the air. In addition
to the process equipment, dust may be generated
from unpaved roads and storage piles.

An air construction permit allows a facility to construct and start operation of the equipment proposed in their air permit application. State and federal regulations have established standards that are protective of the environment and public health, including the health of sensitive populations such as asthmatics, children, and the elderly.

Luck Stone has applied to receive a synthetic miner construction permit establishing federally enforceable limits that require their emissions to stay below major emission thresholds of 250 tons per year of particulate matter with a diameter greater than 10 microns and below 110 tons per year for particulate matter with a diameter less than 10 microns. The draft permit also includes opacity limits of 7 percent for the screens and conveyors, 12 percent for crushers, and 20 percent facilitywide. The facility will demonstrate compliance with these limits by operating its wet suppression systems in accordance with the conditions of this permit.



1	As part of the air permitting process, the
2	facility is required to demonstrate compliance with
3	the National Ambient Air Quality Standard for
4	particulate less than 10 microns and less than 2.5
5	microns. These standards were established to be
6	protective of public health and welfare. The
7	compliance demonstration with these standards for
8	particulate matter less than 10 microns was
9	completed using the controlled emission rates, an
10	EPA-approved model. The estimated total
11	concentration for the project is below the
12	standard.
13	The controlled emissions for particulate
14	matter less than 2.5 microns were below the
15	exemption threshold for modeling of less than 1.14
16	pounds per hour, and therefore is not required to
17	be modeled. Based on the compliance demonstration
18	conducted for Luck Stone, the facility meets these
19	standards.
20	The draft permit requires the facility to
21	minimize and control its dust emissions and to
22	develop a dust control plan that is to be reviewed
23	and approved by the Bureau of Air Quality.
24	At a minimum, the plan shall address and/or
25	contain guidance on how the facility plans to

1	control dust involving water trucks, truck traffic,
2	storage piles, and process equipment. The onsite
3	truck traffic and storage pile dust is typically
4	controlled by water trucks. The dust plan will
5	also include scenarios for water truck failures or
6	inadequacies. Weekly recorded maintenance checks
7	are required for all plant equipment and enclosures
8	to ensure proper operation.
9	The next steps in the air permitting process
10	are as follows. DHEC will review all comments
11	received, provide a written response to all
12	comments, and make a final decision. The final
13	decision date begins the 15-day appeal period.
14	DONNA MOYE: Thank you, Jeremy and Mareesa. As I
15	mentioned earlier, all comments made tonight are
16	being recorded, written comments may also be
17	submitted through the end of the public comment
18	period. That date is on your screen there,
19	September 17th, 2021. All written comments should
20	be addressed to the attention of Jeremy Eddy.
21	As we transition now into the comment portion
22	of this public hearing, I would like to reiterate
22	of this public hearing, I would like to reiterate that DHEC staff are here to listen to your comments



1 tonight. 2 I will now call on those of you who indicated 3 during pre-registration that you would like to make 4 a comment. After I call your name, you may unmute 5 your line and begin your comments. Please state 6 and spell your name for the court reporter prior to 7 speaking. And we will begin with Mr. Steve 8 Dunaway. 9 Mr. Dunaway, you can unmute your line. 10 (Pause.) Mr. Dunaway, are you ---11 STEVE DUNAWAY: Yes. 12 DONNA MOYE: Okay, (**audio interrupted by ringing 13 telephone). STEVE DUNAWAY: You got me now. The old, the old saying 14 15 is, "It's me again, Margaret." We got you before somebody on the phone 16 DONNA MOYE: 17 did, so we're glad to have you with us. 18 STEVE DUNAWAY: Yeah. 19 DONNA MOYE: If you'll just spell your name for the, 20 for the court reporter and then you can begin your 21 comments. 22 STEVE DUNAWAY: Okay. It's S-T-E-V-E, D-U-N-A-W-A-Y. 23 DONNA MOYE: Okay, go ahead, Mr. Dunaway. (Pause.) 24 It looks like your line has been muted again. You



can just unmute so we -- There you go.

25

STEVE DUNAWAY: Okay, I'm on the computer this time. 1 DONNA MOYE: 2 Okay. STEVE DUNAWAY: I had a meeting with representatives from 3 Luck Stone this past Friday, and what they gave me, 4 the maps, drawings, and all that, I'm really 5 impressed with the operation they're going to have 6 7 and how they're going to run it. And like I say, I 8 was impressed because they going -- they want to be 9 community friendly and everything. They told me how the new entrance is going to be, direction of 10 the truck traffic is. There would be very few 11 going through the *village of Enoree, like some at 12 the meeting we had Monday night was thinking. 13 Majority of it is going to 26, to Spartanburg and 14 15 Columbia and beyond. And as the trucks* comes in, it'd have to be -16 - it'd be weighed. When it's gets loaded, it'll go 17 through a truck wash. The whole undercarriage of 18 19 the truck gets washed off, tires get washed off, no dust, no mud, no nothing coming out on the road. 20 So, I've got nothing bad to say about them, so 21 22 I'll give my time to someone else if they're on 23 there. Okay, thank you so much, Mr. Dunaway. 24 DONNA MOYE: We're glad that you're with us again and appreciate 25

1	you sharing your comments with us.
2	We do have one other registered, pre-
3	registered speaker before we move on to those who
4	did not pre-register, and that would be Ben
5	Thompson. (Pause.)
6	BEN THOMPSON: Can you hear me?
7	DONNA MOYE: Yes, sir, we can. Please go ahead,
8	remember to state and spell your name for the court
9	reporter and your affiliation please.
10	BEN THOMPSON: Absolutely. My name is Ben Thompson, B-
11	E-N, T-H-O-M-P-S-O-N, and my affiliation is as the
12	applicant with Luck Companies.
13	First and foremost, I just wanted to thank
14	everyone who's on this call and, and meeting for,
15	for coming out and for listening to the
16	presentation and then providing the comments, Mr.
17	Dunaway's comment, and then the forthcoming
18	comments that we have to receive.
19	I would like for anyone that has questions
20	following this meeting to feel free to reach out to
21	us. You can go to our website, which is
22	www.luckcompanies.com, or please give us a call,
23	either myself, Ben Thompson, or call Katie
24	Kosloski, who, who is also working on this project
25	with us, and that phone number is (804) 784-6300.



1	And, and more than anything, I just wanted to share
2	my appreciation, so thank you.
3	DONNA MOYE: Thank you so much, Mr. Thompson.
4	And believe it or not, that concludes the two
5	who signed up to make a comment via the
6	registration form on our webpage, so we will now
7	begin hearing from those of you who did not pre-
8	register to speak but have decided to make a
9	comment.
10	For those of you joining online, please let us
11	know you would like to comment by raising your hand
12	using the hand icon or by clicking on the
13	microphone icon on your screen. For those of you
14	joining by phone, simply press *6 on your phone.
15	As our tech team has noted who is raising a
16	hand or unmuted, your hand will be lowered and you
17	may be muted again to reduce background noise until
18	you are called on to comment. When it is your
19	turn, I will call on you by either your name or the
20	last four digits of the phone number you're calling
21	from.
22	I'll pause a moment now for us to note those
23	who are indicating they would like to speak. If
24	for some reason, you're experiencing difficulty
25	with muting or unmuting your line, please remember



1	that you may submit your comments in writing
2	through September 17th. (Pause.)
3	Again, if you're joining us online, you can
4	raise your hand to indicate that you would like to
5	make a comment or you can unmute your line so that
6	we can note your name. (Pause.) I know we have a
7	good-sized crowd with us tonight; I certainly do
8	want to encourage you, if you have any comments, to
9	share those with us now. This will be your last
10	opportunity to do so in person.
11	KATHERINE YON: Donna, we do have one phone line that has
12	unmuted, the phone number ending in 1785.
13	DONNA MOYE: Thank you so much, Katherine. And I see
14	that that line is unmuted; would you please state
15	your name? (Pause.) You can go ahead. If you're
16	calling in with Okay, there you are.
17	ANN CROSSMAN: Okay, thanks. My name is Anne Crossman,
18	A-N-N, last name, C-R-O-S-S-M-A-N. I have just a
19	few comments.
20	First of all, I read through the hydrologic
21	study done by the Luck Company. I'm concerned
22	about the long-term impact on groundwater here.
23	It's colloidal soil in this area. I believe there
24	are some aquifers, some underground, underground
25	water, clearly, that flows through, so I'm



1	concerned about the long-term impact and water
2	damage, number one.
3	Number two, I have a concern about the choice
4	of this particular site in this county and if it
5	was determined by tax base. The tax base here is,
6	I believe, the lowest in Spartanburg County. So
7	certainly, it's financially beneficial to the
8	company and I have no problem, obviously, with a
9	company being productive, but I do have a concern
10	about the people that live in this area with the,
11	the noise and all sorts of other things.
12	Then, the last comment I have is a concern
13	about the truck traffic. There's been, I, I guess,
14	a promise that it will be primarily on 26.
15	However, there's a significant amount of truck
16	traffic through Woodruff, the City of Woodruff
17	right now, and if you get off 26 and go through
18	Woodruff, it's a real quick way to get where you
19	need to be.
20	So those are my three comments, three
21	concerns. Thank you.
22	DONNA MOYE: Thank you so much, Ms. Crossman. We
23	appreciate you being with us tonight.
24	Again, if you would like to make a comment, if
25	you would unmute your line or raise your hand, we

1	would love to hear those tonight. (Pause.)
2	Don't be shy. If you have a comment, you
3	know, it's really important that we hear those and
4	that we are using those in our process as we
5	continue to review the information that we have.
6	We also want to make sure that we are taking
7	into consideration what your thoughts and concerns
8	are, especially those of you who live locally. So
9	please, if you have a comment that you would like
10	to make, we would love to hear it now. (Pause.)
11	Katherine or Kristy, does it look like anyone
12	else is indicating that they would like to make a
13	comment?
14	KRISTY ELLENBERG: Donna, I'm not seeing any indication
15	at this time. Oh, we've had a hand from Mr.
16	Dunaway again.
17	DONNA MOYE: Okay. Mr. Dunaway, do you have another
18	comment you would like to add?
19	STEVE DUNAWAY: Yes. If anybody's in the local area of
20	Enoree, I have the same drawings and everything
21	that y'all presented. I'll be glad to show it to
22	them and let them,
23	DONNA MOYE: Thank you so much,
24	STEVE DUNAWAY: and let them see.
25	DONNA MOYE: Thank you so much, Mr. Dunaway. And, and

1	you've actually made a very good comment and it's a
2	good reminder for me to make sure that everyone
3	knows that this information is also available on
4	our website. We have begun putting the information
5	on our website to make it more convenient for
6	residents to gain access to it whenever it is
7	convenient for them.
8	So, we certainly do appreciate your offer to
9	share that with your neighbors as well, Mr.
10	Dunaway.
11	STEVE DUNAWAY: Yes, they gave me two packets there and
12	I've got all the information of the mine, of all
13	the phases, and everything to it. So, I thought
14	I'd try I might be a goodwill ambassador towards
15	it.
16	DONNA MOYE: Well, thank you so much, Mr. Dunaway, I'm
17	sure that, that they appreciate that, and I'm sure
18	that they appreciate you sharing your comments with
19	them.
20	STEVE DUNAWAY: Okay.
21	DONNA MOYE: So, it looks like I have called on
22	everyone who wished to make a comment tonight. I
23	will give just a moment for anyone else who would
24	like to make a comment to unmute their line or
25	raise their hand. (Pause.)

1	And if there are no other attendees who would
2	like to make a comment, I will close the comment
3	portion of tonight's public hearing.
4	And on behalf of DHEC, I would like to thank
5	everyone for joining us tonight and giving your
6	comments. Please note once again that written
7	comments may be submitted to DHEC by mail or email
8	through September 17th of 2021. All written
9	comments received on or before this date will be
10	considered in DHEC's decision making processes.
11	It is important to note that DHEC's final
12	decisions on the mine operating permit application
13	and the draft air permit are two separate
14	decisions. Each decision will be made after the
15	public comment period ends as follows. For the
16	draft air permit, DHEC's Bureau of Air Quality will
17	review and consider all comments received and may
18	request additional information from the applicant
19	if necessary. A decision will then be made to
20	approve, disapprove, or modify the draft permit.
21	For the mine operating permit application,
22	DHEC's Bureau of Land and Waste Management will
23	review and consider all comments received and may
24	request additional information from the applicant
25	if necessary. A decision will then be made to



1	approve or deny a mine operating permit.
1	
2	And I will add that although they are two
3	separate permitting decisions, they will be made
4	at, and announced at the same time. Once final
5	permit decisions are made, DHEC will provide
6	notification to everyone on our mailing list. The
7	permit decisions will also be posted on our
8	webpage.
9	If permits are issued for the Luck, Luck Stone
10	Enoree Quarry, a summary response to all comments
11	received will be provided as well. You have the
12	right to request a final review of any permit
13	decision made by DHEC.
14	The final review requests must be submitted in
15	writing to DHEC's Clerk of the Board, along with a
16	filing fee in the amount of \$100, within 15 days
17	after notice of DHEC's permit decision has been
18	mailed. In consideration of this requirement, you
19	will receive notification of DHEC's permit decision
20	by standard US Mail or by email. If you wish to be
21	notified of DHEC's decision by Certified Mail
22	instead, please make your request in writing no
23	later than September 17th, 2021.
24	Finally, if you have questions or if you are
25	interested in discussing specific aspects of the



1	proposed mine, please reach out to us by phone,
2	mail, or email, we will be happy to talk with you
3	more. And I'll give Katherine a moment to put the
4	slide up with those phone numbers for Jeremy and
5	Mareesa. (Pause.) Jeremy's phone number is (803)
6	898-7609, and Mareesa's phone number is area code
7	(803) 898-4113.
8	Once again, DHEC encourages you to help us win
