1	PROCEEDINGS
2	DONNA MOYE: Good evening once again. The time is
3	now7:25 p.m., on Thursday, January 11th, 2024, and
4	this public hearing will now begin. This public
5	hearing is being held by the South Carolina
6	Department of Health and Environmental Control,
7	also known as DHEC, to accept comments on the
8	proposed River Bend Quarry at a site located on
9	Hammett Grove in Spartanburg County, approximately
10	2.7 miles northwest and within the town limits of
11	Pacolet, South Carolina. The purpose of this
12	hearing is to accept comments and supporting
13	information on the mine operating permit
14	application and draft air permit for the proposed
15	quarry. This is a formal proceeding and DHEC staff
16	will not be responding to comments on questions.
17	The comments made tonight are being recorded and
18	will be included in the written transcript prepared
19	by the certified court reporter seated to my right,
20	and the transcript will serve as the official
21	record of this public hearing, it will be posted on
22	our webpage when available. Again, my name is
23	Donna Moye, and I will serve as your hearing
24	officer tonight. Thank you for taking the time to
25	be here for this important step in DHEC's



1	permitting processes. I would also like to welcome
2	and thank all mining representatives, local public
3	officials, and members of your legislative
4	delegation who are in attendance tonight to hear
5	your comments.
6	I mentioned our webpage a moment ago. DHEC
7	has created this webpage for online access to
8	information about the proposed quarry. That
9	webpage address is www.scdhec.gov/RiverBendQuarry.
10	That's all one word. I encourage each of you to
11	visit this webpage for additional notification and
12	future updates.
13	Before I go over how we will proceed there are
14	a couple of items that I would like to address:
15	First, I would ask that you please silence
16	your cell phones or other electronic devices so
17	that others are not disturbed during this hearing.
18	Next, if you have not already done so, I
19	encourage each of you to sign the attendance sheet
20	located at the sign-in table, so that we have a
21	complete record of everyone here tonight. We have
22	asked for your mailing or email address on the
23	sign-in sheet so that we know how to notify you of
24	future information regarding the proposed quarry.
25	The permitting process at DHEC begins when an



1	application is received for one or more
2	environmental permits. During this process, an
3	applicant must show that its proposed operation can
4	comply with all applicable state and federal
5	regulations. These regulations have been written
6	to ensure that human health and the environment are
7	protected. In addition to reviewing the
8	application, DHEC's role is to write and, if
9	issued, enforced permits that meet the requirements
10	of the regulations.
11	You also have a role in DHEC's permitting
12	process. That's what brings us here tonight to
13	receive your comments formally for the record.
14	Although, a final permit decision cannot be made
15	based on a vote or how many people say the same
16	thing, your comments are important and may provide
17	DHEC staff with additional things to consider
18	before final decisions are made. Comments and
19	concerns given here tonight, as well as those
20	submitted in writing by the end of the public
21	comment period, are welcomed and encouraged.
22	Presentations on the proposed quarry and
23	DHEC's permitting processes were provided by Sarah
24	Harris of DHEC's Mining and Reclamation Section and
25	Mareesa Singleton of DHEC's Air Permitting



1	Division, during the public meeting held at 6:00
2	p.m. These presentations will be made available on
3	our webpage before the end of the public comment
4	period.
5	We will now move on to the order in which we
6	will proceed with this hearing. Brief statements
7	about the proposed quarry will be read for the
8	record by Sarah Harris and Mareesa Singleton.
9	I will then begin the public comment portion
10	of the evening by randomly calling on those of you
11	who have indicated on the sign-in sheet that you
12	would like to make a comment. If you have decided
13	that you no longer wish to comment when you are
14	called on, you may decline at that time.
15	Finally, I will give anyone who has not had a
16	chance to speak the opportunity to make your
17	comments.
18	After all comments have been heard, I will
19	make closing remarks and this public hearing will
20	be adjourned.
21	For everyone to have a fair and equal
22	opportunity to participate tonight, and to ensure
23	that we proceed in a timely and effective manner,
24	the following four guidelines have been
25	established:



1	First, there will be no questions or answers
2	during or after any presentation or comment.
3	Second, your comments should not go over three
4	minutes per individual or five minutes for elected
5	officials and those speaking on behalf of an
6	organized group. I will gently remind you if you
7	do not conclude your comments at that time. If you
8	are not able to present your comments within the
9	allotted time, please remember that you may submit
10	them to DHEC in writing by the close of the public
11	comment period.
12	Third, please be respectful towards anyone
13	speaking here tonight and follow the time limit
14	that has been set. You each have a unique and
15	valued perspective. No one comment is considered
16	more important than another.
17	And fourth, please do not interrupt or ask
18	participants to respond to your comments. Should
19	any comments or actions begin to move away from the
20	intent of this hearing, I may ask the speaker to
21	limit their statements and be seated.
22	I will now call on Sarah Harris to read a
23	brief statement about the mine operating permit
24	application.
25	SARAH HARRIS: On October 23, 2023, River Bend



1 Aggregates, LLC submitted a mine operating permit 2 application to mine granite in Spartanburg County. 3 Total permitted are will be 443.1 acres, consisting of 241.1 affected acres, 95 acre -- 95.8 acres of 4 5 future reserves, and 105.9 acres of buffer. The 6 reclamation plan proposes to reclaim the site to a 7 pond or lake and grasslands. 8 DONNA MOYE: Thank you, Sarah. I will now call on Mareesa Singleton to read a brief statement 9 10 about the draft air permit. Mareesa. 11 MAREESA SINGLETON: River Bend Aggregate, LLC has applied to the Department for an air 12 13 construction permit to install and operate a new 14 aggregate mine and processing plant. 15 A draft permit and draft statement of basis 16 have been written outlining the proposed project 17 and applicable regulations. This permit will 18 enable the facility to construct and operate in 19 compliance with state and federal air quality 20 regulations. The permit includes federally 21 enforceable facility-wide limits of less than 250 22 tons per year of particular matter emissions and 23 less than 100 tons per year of particular matter emissions less than ten microns so that the 24

facility may remain below major source thresholds



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1	for both the Title V Operating Permit and the
2	Prevention Prevention of Significant
3	Deterioration regulations.
4	DONNA MOYE: Thank you, Mareesa. We will now
5	begin hearing from those of you who indicated on
6	the sign-in sheet that you would like to make a
7	comment. All commenters will be called upon in
8	random order. And, please, clearly state and spell
9	your name for the court reporter before you begin
10	speaking. And I would like to start with Mayor
11	Camby, Mayor of Pacolet. Mayor Camby, actually
12	MAYOR NED CAMBY: Sure.
13	DONNA MOYE: I forgotten to mention that
14	all comments can be made from that microphone that
15	Mayor Camby is going to.
16	MAYOR NED CAMBY: Ned Camby's N-e-d C-a-m-b-y.
17	I'd like to thank DHEC in the role for making fewer
18	companies come into South Carolina abide by the
19	laws and and being safe for our people,
20	communities. Pacolet is a great community, has a
21	rich history, and has close-knit people. We we
22	have, we'd had, had much opportunity waiting on
23	develop in recent years that have helped the town
24	jobs, infrastructure, and investment. River Bend
25	is fairly new, something that could positively



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	1	impact the community for years to come. Since the
	2	first meeting with representatives here have been
	3	they we been very transparent, open and their plans
	4	with their plans for development. In fact, based
	5	on what River Bend and its affiliates have done in
	6	other parts of the country, we we're sure that
	7	they are good citizens and, you know, good
	8	corporate citizens and will make good neighbors.
	9	We we have taken the time to learn, they have
	10	taken the time to learn about Pacolet, understand
	11	the questions and needs and have reemphasized being
	12	responsible, safe, in the in their planning of
	13	the Pacolet location. This is a type of
	14	development that we need, Pacolet wanted, the River
	15	Bend River Bend's commitment to be part of the
	16	community is to help us with much needs and
	17	opportunities in Pacolet, and and and one of
	18	the reasons the project has been unanimously
	19	supported by town council. We look forward to
	20	ongoing communications and partnerships with River
	21	Bend and appreciate that the commitment to our
	22	community and its people.
	23	DONNA MOYE: I think I just discovered a flaw
	24	in the plan, so I m going to move this over here.
	25	Okay. Next, I would like to call on the Mayor of



1	Cowpens, Jarred Spencer.
2	MAYOR JARRED SPENCER: Good evening. My name
3	is Jarred Spencer, Mayor of the Town of Cowpens.
4	Mayor Camry said it all just a minute ago. As the
5	Mayor of the Town of Cowpens I m extremely excited
6	for the mayor and council and the community. It's
7	not every day you see this kind of investment being
8	brought into our small towns, and it and it's huge,
9	and it looks like they've done their homework.
10	DHEC has definitely done their homework it sounds
11	like. So it looks like everything's
12	environmentally sound. As far as picking up the
13	development point of view, again it's huge for a
14	small town like this, so we're very happy. Cowpens
15	is, Cowpens and Pacolet have close ties, they're
16	brought together by the A3 community. So we're
17	we're happy for Pacolet. It sounds like a real
18	good thing for the community as well, so we
19	congratulate them.
20	DONNA MOYE: Thank you, Mayor Spencer. Okay.
21	I believe I have County Councilman David Britt.
22	COUNCILMAN DAVID BRITT: Thank you. And I
23	will question your randomness in the selections
24	right now, two mayors and a councilman, but first
25	of all, and I am honored to be here with you. My



1	name is David Britt. B-r-i-t-t. And I am serve
2	on Spartanburg County Council. But just sitting
3	here I think about the rich history, as the mayor
4	pointed out, of Pacolet, in fact, if it weren't for
5	Pacolet, Mr. Montgomery and Mr. Milliken over a 130
6	years ago, we wouldn't have the economic success
7	that we've had over these last 31 years, there
8	would be no BMW, there would be no Toray, there
9	would be no River Birch Trail, the PAL trails that
10	are out there, because it all started right here.
11	And the people that work that work and live in
12	Spartanburg over these 130 years have set us on
13	this course. Again, I too congratulate DHEC and
14	applaud you for having this meeting. I also
15	applaud the people who showed up. The lady that
16	had the question about the roads, the gentleman
17	about the runoff, those are the questions that I
18	first had when I heard about this project, and I
19	posed them, you know, to the company, as well as to
20	the town of Pacolet, these. And I am here to say
21	that the mayor and the town council of Pacolet have
22	done a yeoman's job in not only getting those
23	questions answered but getting concessions and
24	aggrievance in writing in from River Bend
25	Aggregates Aggregates. Just like your question



1	about turning on Hammett Grove Road, and I can be
2	able to go left, that was the company's decision,
3	move it right. How your your question about the
4	road, how the thing is going to be, you know, not
5	only affected but maintained years to come, the
6	Town of Pacolet got that taken care of, and in
7	writing, and actually has got money coming in even
8	before the project starts. One of my concerns too,
9	and I was just starting to representing Pacolet
10	last January of '23, one of the concerns I have,
11	what's it's going to do for this community and also
12	for the Clifton community, we've got gentlemen, a
13	company getting ready to invest 72 to 75 million
14	dollars in Clifton right along the Pacolet River.
15	And I'll take a little sidebar too, when I think
16	about Clifton and the Pacolet River, probably 20
17	years ago I did a rafting trip with your former
18	mayor, Elaine Harris. She put about 20 people, you
19	know, on that river to get that this river
20	designated as a Blueway. Never been a kayak for
21	almost eight hours, because the river was very
22	shallow, I think I drug that thing, most that
23	that I've ever been in a kayak. But also Elaine
24	Harris drove a station wagon or a truck and picked
25	us up, we dragged the kayaks up this hill on



1	Milliken property, it was terrible. But your mayor
2	again I'll give her a lot of credit, she had a
3	vision about Pacolet and Spartanburg and her love.
4	She was a driving force that got Vulcan to come
5	into the Town of Pacolet. I never have heard of
6	any company coming into a municipality in
7	Spartanburg County, or for that matter, maybe the
8	State of South Carolina, but she did it and kind of
9	set the groundwork for Mayor Camby and his team to
10	make it happen. And with that happening two women
11	are right here that I I think the world of. In
12	fact, I'll say I love them. My wife doesn't mind,
13	and she knows I talk a lot about Katherine O'Neill
14	and Laura Ringo all the time. She wants to know
15	who this Laura Ringo is by the way. But again, the
16	town negotiated with River Bend Aggregate
17	Aggregates to the point of my concerns about
18	Clifton and their project now was going to be goal
19	laid, because Laura and her team PAL are going to
20	connect that whole riverfront all the way down to
21	Pacolet. You're going to see what's happened just
22	like over in Greenville, we kind of copied some of
23	they what they did on the Swamp Rabbit Trail, and
24	we're seeing it happen right now in Spartanburg
25	County with from Inman to Hendersonville. You



1	know, we having the, you know, the Norfolk Southern
2	Trail, whatever we call the thing, we're already
3	seeing companies buying the old, abandoned
4	manufacturing sites. The Bommer Industries site up
5	in Landrum, that's where TIME Bicycles is going,
6	this is an international company. I see a lot of
7	good things that can happen. Pacolet is not close
8	to the Interstate 85 or 26, and that's what makes
9	it hard to attract companies here. They they
10	want to be near people, more importantly they want
11	to be near Interstates. But you have something
12	with special in Pacolet, a Blueway with the Pacolet
13	River. And now the River Bend Aggregates agreeing
14	not only to allow PAL to come in, making a
15	contribution to help it make make it happen. So
16	I applaud the town council, the mayor, and the
17	people of Pacolet for making this happen. And I
18	fully support you, and I will do everything, and
19	I've committed that to the town, and to the town
20	council of Pacolet and the mayor and the community
21	that we will make sure that we work in partnership
22	with River Bend Aggregates to make your roads
23	your road questions take place, your runoff back
24	there, and even your air quality, we'll do what we
25	can. But the fact is they didn't really have to do



1	all of this stuff. If as DHEC said, if they meet
2	the requirements, they bought the property, but
3	what they've done is just like other companies who
4	have negotiated here, they've agreed to good, be
5	good community partners and neighbors. So I I
6	support your mayor and your town council. And
7	again, thank you all for turning out and making
8	these questions and comments. Thank you. I hope
9	that was within five minutes, that's a record and -
10	-
11	DONNA MOYE: I was going to say, you must do
12	this often, because it was right on the dot.
13	MR. BRITT: But that's what we already count
14	that's
15	DONNA MOYE: Thank you, Councilman Britt. I
16	know we have some other elected officials here, but
17	I am going to go ahead and start, I know that the
18	three that just spoke specifically asked to speak,
19	so we wanted to make sure that we gave them the
20	opportunity to do so, so that you could hear their
21	comments ahead of your own. So now I will go on to
22	Michael Easley.
23	MICHAEL EASLEY: I pass.
24	DONNA MOYE: Okay. Please, let the record
25	reflect that Mr. Easley is not going to comment at



1	this time. Next, I have Brenda Smith. No Brenda
2	Smith? Please, let the record reflect that Ms.
3	Smith is no longer here. Julie Fowler.
4	SUPERINTENDENT JULIE FOWLER: Julie. J-u-l-i-
5	e. Fowler. F-o-w-l-e-r. Good evening, everyone,
6	Mayor Camby, town council members, elected
7	officials, and our legislative delegation, other
8	leaders in this room, and all of these
9	stakeholders. I am the proud Superindendant of
10	Spartanburg School District 3. And before I
11	address what we're here to talk about, I would be
12	remiss if I did not take this opportunity to tell
13	you that District 3 is on the move. Our school
14	performance is skyrocketing. We have students who
15	want to come into our district. What we want are
16	rooftops and families who live in our communities,
17	not who want to come from neighboring counties, and
18	this is an industry to make that happen. Economic
19	development is critical to our mission. I had the
20	opportunity to meet with Doug, a representative
21	from River Bend. I didn't ask questions tonight
22	because all of my questions had been answered. I
23	asked a lot of the questions that you all asked and
24	more. And here's what is vitally important, all of
25	the technical things are critical, but here's what



1	I learned. The thing that makes the municipalities
2	and the communities that District 3 serves so
3	special are the people. That's why we are who we
4	are, we do what we do, and we're stellar performers
5	across the board, River Bend recognizes this, they
6	have. This is not their first project. They have
7	six other projects, where the evidence is very
8	clear they've come into communities like Pacolet,
9	and they have done exactly what they have said they
10	were going to do. The evidence is there. What I
11	learned from talking to River Bend that I that
12	we didn't get to hear tonight because it wasn't the
13	purpose of it and thank you DHEC for everything
14	that you've done, you've gotten off very early, it
15	was also imperative to drive this whole project
16	but what you didn't hear and is that I was able to
17	hear were what they were doing to partner with the
18	school district, with the community,
19	beautification, economic mobility, walkability,
20	opening up so many opportunities to things that do
21	attract families to municipalities like this. And,
22	yes, Laura, the trail, the trail is going to come
23	in here and give us access as well. We do have the
24	Pacolet River. We can there's so many
25	advantages. I try not to talk about disadvantages



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	1	or barriers, such as where we're located and we're
	2	not close to an Interstate. There's so many things
	3	this community offers that no one else can touch.
	4	And so I thank all of the leaders that are here for
	5	giving all of us as stakeholders the opportunity to
	6	vet such a great opportunity. And we've got to be
	7	open to doing our homework, doing our due
	8	diligence, and being able to be swift and take
	9	action when a great opportunity is before us. So
	10	River River Bend, thank you all for doing all of
	11	the preplanning. I have been, I've just been
	12	absolutely amazed at what you have done in
	13	preparation before coming in. You want to know who
	14	we are, and it shows. So thank you for that.
	15	Thank you for working with DHEC. Thank you for
	16	going above and beyond. And you know what, you
	17	just know when you know, but I already have this
	18	strong sense that you are who you say you are, that
	19	you re going to be here to support us and just to
	20	support the people, the special sauce what will
	21	make the Pacolet project different from your other
	22	six projects. So thank you.
	23	DONNA MOYE: Okay. Thank you, Ms. Fowler.
	24	Next, I have Carol Theiler. I may be pronouncing
	25	that last name wrong, Theiler. Theiler. T-h-e-i-



1	l-e-r. Ms. Carol here still, no? Laura Ringo.
2	LAURA RINGO: Good evening. My name is Laura
3	Ringo. I m the Executive Director of PAL, Play
4	Advocate Local. We are developing a 55-mile urban
5	trail that works that's made up of existing and
6	proposed trail segments. Currently most of those
7	trail segments are in the urban area of
8	Spartanburg, but we're working on an eastern
9	connection. So right now we know that we can get
10	to Glendale, and we're working on Glendale out to
11	the Pacolet River, and so from there we look
12	forward to connecting into the Clifton community
13	and also to the town of Pacolet. The trail system
14	will benefit our county and those surrounding. And
15	trail systems are great for a lot of reasons, they
16	provide safe and accessible places to be physically
17	active, so they improve our health. They also
18	connect us with nature, which is great for our
19	mental wellbeing. They connect communities,
20	neighbors to each other and then the Pacolet
21	community into the urban center. They're also
22	great for economic development. We're worked with
23	many multifamily developers who are excited to
24	connect into the trail system and provide that as
25	an asset or a resource to their renters. And also



1	if you re living let's say in downtown Spartanburg,
2	it would be a great activity to get your put your
3	family on some bikes and ride out to Pacolet, see
4	the Pacolet River, have lunch in Pacolet. The town
5	of Travelers Rest is a great example of how small
6	communities thrive thanks to trail systems, but
7	trail connections like this only happen with
8	willing property owners. River Bend has agreed to
9	build two miles of trail along their property to
10	help us make this important connection to Pacolet.
11	They've also already started as helping us with the
12	feasibility assessment to really understand what it
13	will take to do this. This will, this will really
14	help us make the connection to Pacolet in the next
15	couple of years. And we appreciate this
16	partnership to develop such an an important
17	community asset.
18	DONNA MOYE: Thank you, Ms. Ringo. Thank you
19	for speaking so loudly. Next, I have Katherine
20	O'Neill. I promise I shuffled these. I see
21	everybody coming from the same little area.
22	KATHERINE O'NEILL: So Katherine O'Neill. K-
23	a-t-h-e-r-i-n-e. O'Neill. O-n-e-i-l-l. My name
24	is Katherine O'Neill, and I'm here tonight
25	representing OneSpartanburg, Inc. It is always



1	important to find the balance between the rights
2	that a property owner has to include extracting
3	from the land and the rights of the adjoining
4	property owners. OneSpartanburg, Inc. is confident
5	that South Carolina Department of Health and
6	Environmental Control, as well as the leadership of
7	the Pacolet town council and their administrator
8	have worked closely with the landowners to strike
9	this balance and to hold the company accountable.
10	I worked closely with the former mayor Elaine
11	Harris. I consider her my friend. And I know that
12	she would be thrilled that the city is working with
13	this company to open up land along the river for
14	public use. And hopefully a trail system aside
15	from the additional city revenue from the company
16	by its establishing its operations here, the space
17	along the river could be a real game changer to
18	attract visitors, an added amenity for local
19	residents. At the end of the day, OneSpartanburg,
20	Inc. has faith in South Carolina DHECs' process and
21	in town councils' judgement and know that they will
22	only maintain the best interest of the public but
23	will also both hold both of them hold the company
24	accountable going forward. OneSpartanburg, Inc.
25	supports this project and thanks in kind DHEC for



1	both your careful review of this permit application
2	and your time in the Pacolet community tonight.
3	Thank you.
4	DONNA MOYE: Thank you, Ms. O'Neill. Next, we
5	have, I think this is Patrick Kay.
6	PATRICK KAY: My name is Patrick Kay. P-a-t-
7	r-i-c-k. Last name is K-a-y. My name is my
8	name is Patrick Kay. I'm the Town Administrator
9	for Pacolet, speaking in support for this project.
10	We've had a long conversation, lots of
11	conversations with River Bend and been through the
12	rest of the one of the things they brought up that
13	some of the things that we didn't necessarily think
14	of that they've already were were thinking of
15	while we were going through this project. We look
16	forward to having them as a community partner here
17	in Pacolet. There are concerns for wildlife. The
18	conversation that Hans and his presentation he gave
19	to council was very interesting in they are have
20	the concerns for the wildlife but also with the
21	wildlife after the the site is actually closed
22	down. The 200-foot buffer was was instrumental,
23	that we wanted to make sure as council to make sure
24	that this is done correctly and and keeps that
25	nice large buffer before the river and then their



1	site. The river is extremely important to the Town
2	of Pacolet, it's given Pacolet it's name, but also
3	for recreation and tourism in this area. The truck
4	washing station was a great benefit that we're
5	really glad to see that all of the trucks will be
6	washed down completely before they actually leave
7	the site, so. Their commitment to the trails and
8	the connectivity, new jobs to the community, their
9	road improvement and their ongoing maintenance for
10	that, and really appreciate the investment that
11	they're going to have in the Town of Pacolet for
12	growth over the next century, if we go that far.
13	Thank you.
14	DONNA MOYE: Thank you, Mr. Kay. Next, we
15	have Hans Dawson.
16	HANS DAWSON: I've already had a chance to
17	speak. Thank you.
18	DONNA MOYE: He has already answered some
19	questions and will will pass on his his time
20	to speak. So again, Mr. Dawson, we thank you for
21	your information, providing information here at the
22	public meeting to the questions that we have. We
23	do appreciate it. Next, I have Chris Jolley.
24	CHRIS JOLLEY: That's Chris Jolley. J-o-l-l-
25	e-y. Chris. My name's Chris Jolley. I am the



Sitting Chairman of Spartanburg County School
District 3. But I'm not here to speak on the
school board's behalf; instead, I want to speak on
behalf of myself who deeply cares about the
communities of District 3, they're our family.
Pacolet is our family. I, of course, am excited
about the possibility of economic impact helping
this town, because the town has shown me that
they've been excited about this and that gets me
excited. I think that any time we can give the
opportunity to see our children succeed we should
embrace that. I think Pacolet River is the hidden
gem of our communities and this is drawing some
more attention to that. I keep waiting for those
individuals that have the the say-so, the
mustard to make things happen for them to see what
we have over here. The Pacolet River is rich in
history for Pacolet, it's taken care of a lot of
families for centuries. We're ready for some
sunshine over here, and I think this is one of
those catalysts to making it help that happen. The
safeguards, my skeptical side of me was addressed
tonight. The skeptical side of me was though I m
excited about the economic impact, I worry about
the safety of our children in this community. I



1	worry about the safety of the families of this
2	community. And I have been impressed with DHEC and
3	the safeguards that you re putting in place. I
4	didn't know that all of this was taking place.
5	This gives me some assurances that I needed. So I
6	can, I can applaud you guys on an excellent
7	presentation and I and giving us some assurances
8	that, you know, so we can lay our head down at
9	night, right. And I want to say of River Bend,
10	these guys have been extremely transparent. Dr.
11	Fowler spoke to this earlier, they met with us to
12	kind of talk a little bit preemptively of what
13	their what their plans were. And I thought that
14	they were looking at a lot of the things that the
15	people of Pacolet would be concerned about, their
16	road, you know, they've had working here, they
17	know. The roads, the safety of their kids, these
18	are things that they genuinely care about. So the
19	Town of Pacolet and the people within 3 will hold
20	you accountable, they will. And and I, and I
21	think that the opportunity for us to have a
22	partnership with you is exciting and hopefully
23	rewarding for us in the future, and I will always
24	always personally support anyone that looks to help
25	and not hurt our folks. So thank you for tonight



1	and thank you for giving me the opportunity to
2	speak to it.
3	DONNA MOYE: Thank you, Mr. Jolley. It looks
4	like the last person I have is Lenny Carr Carr.
5	Now, how did I not get you until the very end? I
6	am so sorry.
7	LENNY CARR: I'm just a
8	DONNA MOYE: I just
9	LENNY CARR: an old old farmer.
10	DONNA MOYE: I just shuffled them around. You
11	just happened to be the last.
12	LENNY CARR: Absolutely.
13	DONNA MOYE: If you could, please, make sure
14	you spell your name for the court reporter.
15	LENNY CARR: Right. My name is Lenny Carr.
16	L-e-n-n-y. C-a-r-r. Most of the questions that I
17	had tonight were answered. A lot of the questions
18	that people asked was in the fact that they didn't
19	know about the company, but I do. I worked for
20	Eastern Rock Production in New York state. What we
21	got these people coming up here and saying I
22	thought, I thought I my driveway is in Cherokee
23	County, that's the direction the trucks will
24	travel, not through Pacolet, that's where they'll
25	go through. They'll go across the bridge, like I



1	said, an empty dump truck would fall through it. I
2	go across it with a piece of farm machinery and a
3	tractor, and it scares me. The road is narrow, and
4	the trucks are large, and we weren't told anything
5	about this happening until a month ago maybe at
6	best. I don t know when it was. I don't even
7	think it was a month ago. And now we got to say
8	something before another ten days or so. So in
9	other words, I feel what they're saying it's
10	already made up their mind, they're going to do it
11	whether we say no or not, and we ain't got money
12	enough to stop it anyhow. But I talked to the
13	fellows tonight about different things. I mean
14	they assured me that everything was going to take
15	place alright. I don't trust politicians. I don't
16	trust school board executives. I don't trust
17	people that lie for a living because they all do.
18	But the man that's going to be more or less heading
19	up the company has spent most of the night with me,
20	and we've talked back and forth, and it sounds like
21	a good deal for everybody around the country. But
22	the only problem that I have with it is, like I
23	said, the danger of the highway, the noise level
24	that I was assured was going to be kept down with
25	the boundaries or whatever you call, the dust
25	the boundaries or whatever you call, the dust



1	levels because I know they can get out of hand.
2	Somebody spoke about sulfuric acids that will
3	happen with granite, that happens with shale,
4	soapstone, sulfurs. But I thank you for listening
5	to an old farmer. That the only thing that I
6	really want is the safety of it all and the
7	protection of the people that are right next door.
8	But when Vulcan dynamites my widows rattle, and
9	they're a mile-and-a-half away from me. But these
10	people are two-tenths of a mile away, so is my
11	house going to jump up and down? We hope not. We
12	wish you all good deals. Thank you.
13	DONNA MOYE: Thank you, Mr. Carr. And I am so
14	appreciative that DHEC was not among those you
15	stated you do not trust. We often hear the
16	opposite at these meetings.
17	MR. CARR: Well, I would tell you what DHEC
18	is, I don't trust it.
19	DONNA MOYE: Oh, man, but
20	MR. CARR: I got to be honest with you, I
21	don t trust them that much, but I fear them more
22	than don't not trusting them.
23	DONNA MOYE: So appreciate your honesty with
24	us. That concludes everyone who signed up to make
25	a comment. I would like to give anybody the



1	opportunity to comment now who did not sign up but
2	is the thought has decided that they would like to.
3	I think maybe this young lady right here. So you
4	can come on up. Please, make sure you state and
5	spell your name for the court reporter.
6	CHANTAL LEMMONDS: Good evening. My name is
7	Chantel Lemmonds. It's C-h-a-n-t-a-l. L-e-m-m-o-
8	n-d-s. And tonight I just wanted to take an
9	opportunity to thank the DHEC, as well as River
10	Rock Aggregate. I appreciate your transparency,
11	your willingness to address the community, have our
12	questions answered. On the flip side of that
13	though I would like to say that I do not praise the
14	Town of Pacolet. I do not think that I would ve
15	been able to make this meeting and have my concerns
16	and questions answered had I not been informed by
17	for another citizen within our town of the DHEC
18	notice that you all put out as is required. I live
19	in the town, and I have recently set out a
20	grievance concerning facts that citizens are not
21	aware of things like this. They are not on the
22	Facebook page. We did not receive written
23	notification of this. I believe that there is an
24	entire part of our community that is not being
25	informed and not having their questions answered



1	and addressed tonight because we were not formally
2	told as citizens that this meeting was going to
3	happen. But again, I'm excited for what's going to
4	happen. I'm excited that we have revenue coming
5	into our town from people that are willing to
6	answer our questions and take the time to be here
7	this evening to address those concerns. And I
8	thank DHEC for coming in and making you re that our
9	community will be safe when these things happen.
10	But again, I'm very disappointed in our town for
11	not doing better to let our citizens know what is
12	happening within the town. Thank you.
13	DONNA MOYE: Thank you so much. Is there
14	anyone else who has decided that they would like to
15	make a comment that's not already done so? Come on
16	up, ma'am. Again, just make sure that you state
17	and spell your name for the court reporter.
18	JOANNE ARMSTRONG: Hello. I'm Joanne
19	Armstrong. J-o-a-n-n-e. And Armstrong. And I'm
20	speaking as an adjacent landowner who was notified
21	of the meeting tonight, didn't have a lot of
22	notice. So I've been looking over the application,
23	and I have a couple of comments to add to the
24	application. On page 5, it talks about the
25	reclamation cost estimate, the bond, and it's



1	stating that 25 or more acres, the bond amount is
2	25,000 or more. I don't think 25,000 is
3	sufficient. I don't think so. And it says so it
4	can be increased. So my suggestion is, what I did
5	is take the number of acres in this project, 443
6	and divide by the 25,000, and I came up with
7	roughly \$1,000 a acre \$443,000 is what I would
8	suggest for the bond amount. Because, you know,
9	you always have to I'm in a business world, so
10	you always have to plan and write in right from the
11	beginning for things to go wrong. And how are we
12	going to be protected, you know, if it doesn't work
13	out at all the way it's supposed to, it's just a
14	giant scar, you know. So I would like to increase
15	the bond amount, I would suggest that. And then
16	also on page 5 it says the number of years for
17	which this permit is requested, it says the life of
18	the mine. I am not agreeing with that. I would
19	like to see a specific number of years, ten or
20	twenty years, renewable, you know, so an
21	application permit, definitely renewable. But I
22	would not recommend right off the bat to give a
23	lifetime permit, you know, have it be open-ended
24	like that. I'd like to see how the project goes,
25	have a chance to reevaluate it. I know people like



1	my comments but alright. The question I had, I
2	think they addressed this in the the prior
3	meeting, which I was not able to be here that soon.
4	I'd like to know more about in in writing what
5	this mine operator has done as far as the other
6	projects, this this LLC in particular and
7	members of the LLC, their background and their
8	experience and what their role is going to be in
9	this project. So I'd like to know more about that.
10	I'd like to know the number of employees that will
11	work here and the salary range of those employees.
12	So I m not sure if that was discussed earlier but
13	that's what I'd like to know. Thank you for
14	listening to my comments.
15	DONNA MOYE: Thank you, Ms. Armstrong. Is
16	there anyone else who would like to make a comment?
17	Anyone else that would like to make comment?
18	Ms. Armstrong, I would like to say, please,
19	make sure you connect with DHEC staff tonight, so
20	that we can have additional conversation with you,
21	answer those questions that you have.
22	Since there are no other attendees that would
23	like to speak, the comment portion of tonight's
24	public hearing is concluded. On behalf of DHEC I
25	would like to thank everyone for coming here



1	tonight and giving us your comments.
2	Please, note once again that written comments
3	may be submitted to DHEC through Friday, January
4	26, 2024. All written comments received on or
5	before this date will be considered in DHEC's
6	decision making process.
7	If you have questions about submitting written
8	comments after tonight, please see a DHEC staff
9	member before you leave.
10	It is important to note DHEC's final decisions
11	on the mine operating permit application and the
12	draft air permit are two separate decisions. Each
13	discussion will be made after the public comment
14	period ends as follows:
15	For the draft air permit: DHEC's Bureau of
16	Air Quality will review and consider all comments
17	received and may request additional information
18	from the applicant if necessary. A decision will
19	then be made to approve, disapprove, or modify the
20	draft air permit.
21	For the mine operating permit application:
22	DHEC's Bureau of Plant and Waste Management will
23	review and consider all comments received and may
24	request additional information from the applicant
25	if necessary. A decision will then be made to



1	approve or to deny a mine operating permit.
2	These final decisions will be made
3	concurrently, once they are made DHEC will provide
4	summary responses to all comments received. The
5	permit discussions and summary responses will be
6	provided to everyone who signed in here tonight, as
7	well as those who submitted written comments during
8	the public comment hearing. The final permit
9	decisions and summary responses will also be posted
10	on our webpage.
11	You have the right to request a final review
12	of any permit decision made by DHEC. The final
13	review request must be submitted in writing to
14	DHEC's Clerk of the Board, along with a filing fee
15	in the amount of \$100 within 15 days after notice
16	of DHEC's permit decision has been mailed.
17	In consideration of this requirement, you will
18	receive notification of DHEC's permit decision by
19	standard U.S. Mail or by email. If you wish to be
20	notified of DHEC's final decision by certified mail
21	instead, please makes your request in writing no
22	later than January 26, 2024.
23	Finally, if you have questions, or if you are
24	interested in discussing specific aspects of the
25	proposed River Bend Quarry, please reach out to any



1	of our staff members. We will be happy to continue
2	a conversation with you. You can reach Sarah
3	Harris at (803)898-3887, and Mareesa Singleton at
4	(803)898-4113.
5	On behalf of DHEC, thank you again for your
6	attendance and comments this evening. The time is
