Regulation Development Process

The South Carolina Department of Health and Environmental Control ("DHEC" or "Department") develops regulations in accordance with the South Carolina Administrative Procedures Act ("APA"), S.C. Code Sections 1-23-10 et seq. Regulation Development Actions include promulgation of new regulations and amendment and repeal of existing regulations. The Department promulgates regulations consistent with and under its authority as prescribed by governing law.

Initiation of Regulation Development Action

The Department initiates Regulation Development Actions pursuant to governing law, public comment, internal analysis, or other relevant circumstances.



Notice of Drafting

The Department files a Notice of Drafting ("NOD") providing an overview of the proposed Regulation Development Action for publication in the *South Carolina State Register*. The NOD sets a thirty-day period in which DHEC receives public comments on the proposal.



Notice of Proposed Regulation

After considering public comments and conducting stakeholder outreach as necessary, DHEC seeks approval from the S.C. Board of Health and Environmental Control ("Board") to publish a Notice of Proposed Regulation ("NPR") in the *South Carolina State Register*. The NPR specifies new regulatory text and/or changes to existing text resulting from the proposed Regulation Development Action. The NPR also sets the time and date of a Public Hearing and another thirty-day period for public comments.



Notice of Final Regulation and Public Hearing

After considering public comments and conducting stakeholder outreach as necessary, DHEC submits a Notice of Final Regulation ("NFR") to the Board for final determination of need and reasonableness of the proposed Regulation Development Action. The Public

Hearing allows the public to provide comments on the proposed action directly to the Board. After considering the DHEC staff presentation and public comments, the Board renders a decision as to whether the proposed action should advance.



Legislative review is required unless the Regulation Development Action is for maintaining compliance with federal law or is an emergency regulation.

Legislative Review Not Required

Following Board approval at the Public Hearing, DHEC files the NFR for publication in the South Carolina State Register. The new regulation, amendment, or repeal takes effect upon the date of this publication.



Legislative Review Required

Following Board approval at the Public Hearing, submits the NFR to the South Carolina General Assembly. In accordance with the APA, the General Assembly has one hundred twenty days of the legislative session to approve or disapprove the NFR. Upon legislative approval or completion of the one hundred twenty days, the Legislative Council publishes the NFR in the South Carolina State Register. The new regulation, amendment, or repeal takes effect upon the date of this publication.

Environmental Affairs

R.61-34 Raw Milk for Human Consumption
R.61-34.1 Pasteurized Milk and Milk Products

Summary:

The Department amended R.61-34 to address the further processing and sale of raw milk products, specifically cream, buttermilk, and kefir, and added additional consumer advisory changes that would be needed for products that receive further processing or become necessary as a byproduct of further processing. The revisions also updated raw milk standards as needed to align certain requirements with the 2019 version of the U.S. Food and Drug Administration Pasteurized Milk Ordinance ("PMO").

The Department amended R.61-34.1 to adopt updated requirements of the 2019 PMO to enable South Carolina milk producers to continue to meet federal standards and ship milk and milk products for interstate commerce. The Department also provided clarification of requirements for potable water sources.

The Department revised these regulations for clarity and readability, grammar, punctuation, and codification, and other regulatory text improvements. Additionally, the amendments to both regulations included updates to administrative and enforcement provisions.

R.61-56 Onsite Wastewater Systems

Summary:

The Department amended R.61-56 to clarify a definition relating to rippable rock and to update procedures for processing applications associated with subdivisions and variances, as well as expanded the provision for who is allowed to perform soil evaluations and prepare onsite wastewater system layouts.

*The regulation will not be fully effective until July 1, 2022, as Proviso 34.64 of the 2021-2022 General Appropriations Act directs the Department to regulate onsite wastewater systems in the same manner as such systems were regulated on January 12, 2021. This proviso expires June 30, 2022.

R.61-62 | Air Pollution Control Regulations and Standards

Summary:

Promulgated to maintain compliance with federal law and exempt from General Assembly review.

The United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) promulgates amendments to the Code of Federal Regulations (CFR) throughout each calendar year. The Department amended R.61-62.60, South Carolina Designated Facility Plan and New Source Performance Standards, and R.61-62.63, National Emission Standards for Hazardous Air Pollutants (NESHAP) for Source Categories, to incorporate by reference federal amendments promulgated from January 1, 2020, through December 31, 2020.

The Department also amended R.61-62.5, Standard No. 7, Prevention of Significant Deterioration (PSD), and R.61-62.5, Standard No. 7.1, Nonattainment New Source Review (NSR), and the State Implementation Plan (SIP), to incorporate EPA's clarification of Project Emissions Accounting, as published in the Federal Register on November 24, 2020 (85 FR 74890), to incorporate EPA's corrections to NSR regulations, as published in the Federal Register on July 19, 2021 (86 FR 37918), and to make other amendments, as necessary, to maintain compliance with federal law.

The Department amended R.61-62.70, Title V Operating Permit Program, to codify relevant federal amendments to Title V provisions, as published in the Federal Register on February 5, 2020 (85 FR 6431), to ensure compliance with federal law.

The Department made additional changes to R.61-62, Air Pollution Control Regulations and Standards, for overall quality of regulatory text as deemed necessary to maintain compliance with federal law. These changes included corrections or other changes for internal consistency, clarification, reference, punctuation, codification, formatting, spelling, and overall improvement to the text of R.61-62.

R.61-79 Hazardous Waste Management Regulations

Summary:

The Department amended R.61-79 to adopt the Environmental Protection Agency ("EPA") final rule, "Modernizing Ignitable Liquids Determinations," published in the Federal Register on July 7, 2020, at 85 FR 40594 40608. This rule updated flash point test methods used to determine if a liquid waste is hazardous. It allows the use of non-mercury thermometers in approved analytical methods that currently require mercury thermometers. This rule also provided greater clarity to determinations of hazardous waste, provided more flexibility in testing requirements, and improved environmental compliance, thereby enhancing the protection of human health and the environment. Because this rule is no more or less stringent than current Federal requirements, the EPA made state adoption optional.

Healthcare Quality

R.61-7 Emergency Medical Services

Summary:

The Department amended R.61-7 to update provisions in accordance with current practices and standards. Amendments incorporated and revised provisions and definitions to conform to statutory mandates and terminology widely used and understood within the provider community. The Department revised requirements for Emergency Medical Technician (EMT) training programs, ambulance design and equipment, incident reporting, sanitation and infection control, monetary penalties, and other requirements for EMS agency licensure, ambulance permitting, and EMT certification. The Department also amended the regulation to provide direction to emergency personnel in identifying patients who have a Do Not Resuscitate Order ("DNR"), and to add oversight of the Physician Orders for Scope of Treatment (POST) form and carry out other related responsibilities to the form.

The Department further revised for clarity and readability, grammar, references, codification, and overall improvement to the text of the regulation.

R.61-75 Standards for Licensing Day Care Facilities for Adults

Summary:

The Department amended R.61-75 to update provisions in accordance with current practices and standards. Amendments incorporated and revised provisions relating to statutory mandates, updated definitions to conform to terminology widely used and understood within the provider community, and revised requirements for incident reporting, staffing and training, medication management, patient care and services, infection control, meal service, emergency procedures, design and construction, fire and life safety, and licensure. The amendments also updated the structure of the regulation throughout for consistency with other DHEC Healthcare Quality regulations.

The Department further revised R.61-75 for clarity and readability, grammar, references, codification, and overall improvement to the text of the regulation.

The Department amended R.61-77 to ensure alignment with current federal and state laws, and revised definitions and requirements for obtaining licensure, inspections, personnel, enforcement, patient care, record maintenance and retention, and licensure standards.

2022-2023 Proposed Regulation Development Actions

R.61-107.20 **Solar Energy Systems**

Summary:

Pursuant to Section 5 of 2022 Act No. 119 (the "Act"), the Department was directed to submit regulations which develop rules to guide all South Carolinians invested in, selling, installing, and using photovoltaic modules and energy storage system batteries in the management of end-oflife photovoltaic modules and energy storage system batteries on solar projects and the decommissioning of solar projects in excess of thirteen acres. The Department proposes promulgating a new regulation as directed in the Act. The new regulation will establish rules for the responsible management and disposal of materials and equipment used in utility-scale solar projects, including local approval of a site plan and the submission of a nonbinding management plan. The rules may also include financial assurance, stewardship, and reporting requirements.

Water Pollution Control Permits R.61-9

Summary:

The Department proposes to amend certain parts of R.61-9 to specify requirements, as needed, for analysis, monitoring, recordkeeping, and reporting related to per- and polyfluoroalkyl substances ("PFAS")-class chemicals in sludge and effluent intended for land application. The affected sections of the regulation may include R.61-9.122, R.61-9.503, R.61-9.504, and R.61-9.505.

The proposed amendments may also include corrections for clarity and readability, grammar, punctuation, codification, and other such regulatory text improvements.

R.61-58 | State Primary Drinking Water Regulations

Summary:

Promulgated to maintain compliance with federal law and exempt from General Assembly review.

The Department proposes amending R.61-58 to adopt federal regulations commonly referred to as the Lead and Copper Rule Revisions, which were promulgated by the United States Environmental Protection Agency ("EPA") in a final rule published in the Federal Register on January 15, 2021 (86 FR 4198).

The proposed amendments to R.61-58, as adopted from the Lead and Copper Rule Revisions, include new and/or revised requirements for lead service line inventories, public education and outreach, and testing for lead in drinking water at schools and day cares.

The Department may also propose other changes to R.61-58 as deemed necessary to maintain compliance with federal law and improve the overall text of R.61-58. These changes may include corrections or other changes for internal consistency, clarification, reference, punctuation, codification, formatting, and spelling.

R.61-62 Air Pollution Control Regulations and Standards

Summary:

Promulgated to maintain compliance with federal law and exempt from General Assembly review.

The United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) promulgates amendments to the Code of Federal Regulations (CFR) throughout each calendar year. The Department proposes amending R.61-62.60, South Carolina Designated Facility Plan and New Source Performance Standards, and R.61-62.63, National Emission Standards for Hazardous Air Pollutants (NESHAP)

for Source Categories, to incorporate by reference federal amendments promulgated from January 1, 2021, through December 31, 2021.

The Department also proposes amending R.61-62.70, Title V Operating Permit Program, at 70.5(c), to correct an error in an earlier amendment as required by the EPA to maintain compliance with federal law.

The Department may also propose other changes to R.61-62, Air Pollution Control Regulations and Standards, as deemed necessary to maintain compliance with federal law. These changes may include corrections or other changes for internal consistency, clarification, reference, punctuation, codification, formatting, spelling, and overall improvement to the text of R.61-62.

R.61-68 Water Classifications and Standards

Summary:

Pursuant to Section 303(c) of the federal Clean Water Act ("CWA"), South Carolina's water quality standards must be reviewed and revised, where necessary, at least once every three years. Referred to as the triennial review, this required process consists of reviewing the designated water uses, criteria, and antidegradation policy. The Department will review and adopt, where appropriate, the Environmental Protection Agency's updated numeric and narrative criteria according to Section 304(a), Section 304(f), and Section 307(a) of the CWA. In reviewing its water classifications and standards, the Department will give consideration to the factors listed in S.C. Code Section 48-1-80 and update R.61-68, Water Classifications and Standards, where appropriate.

The Department proposes amending R.61-68 to adopt revised water quality standards as deemed necessary to comply with federal updates and recommendations. The Department also proposes amending R.61-68 as deemed necessary to comply with the Pollution Control Act, S.C. Code Sections 48-1-10 et. seq.

The proposed amendments may also include corrections for clarity and readability, grammar, punctuation, codification, and other such regulatory text improvements.

R.61-69 Classified Waters

Summary:

Pursuant to Section 303(c) of the federal Clean Water Act ("CWA"), South Carolina's water quality standards must be reviewed and revised, where necessary, at least once every three years. Referred to as the triennial review, this required process consists of reviewing and amending, where appropriate, designated uses and criteria for the site-specific standards set forth in R.61-69. The Department proposes amending R.61-69 to clarify and correct as needed waterbody names, counties, classes, and descriptions.

The proposed amendments may also include corrections for clarity and readability, grammar, punctuation, codification, and other such regulatory text improvements.

R.61-15 | Certification of Need for Health Facilities and Services

Summary:

The Department proposes amending R.61-15 for consistency with statutory requirements, to enable an electronic application process, to revise the application format and additional information required for the application process, and update exemption and non-applicability determination processes. The Department also proposes adding, removing, and modifying definitions contained within the regulation. The Department may update language and processes related to public hearings on Certificate of Need applications, the application and review process and related notifications, voidance and extension procedures, and periodic and final reporting requirements regarding issued Certificates of Need. The amendments may also revise the project review criteria and the monetary thresholds that trigger a Certificate of Need review.

The proposed amendments may also include corrections for clarity and readability, grammar, punctuation, codification, and other such regulatory text improvements.

Minimum Standards for Licensing Hospitals and Institutional General Infirmaries

Summary:

The Department proposes amending R.61-16 to ensure alignment with current state laws and to update and revise definitions and requirements regarding licensure, inspections, enforcement, management, medical staff, nursing services, patient safety, policies and procedures, incident reporting, accommodations for patients, medical records, vital statistics, emergency preparedness and response, food service, maintenance, laundry, linen, housekeeping, refuse disposal, infection control, physical plant, design requirements, construction requirements, hazardous elements of construction, fire protection, fire prevention, engineering and exits, and standards for specialized departments or services.

The proposed amendments may also include corrections for clarity and readability, grammar, punctuation, codification, and other such regulatory text improvements.

Summary:

The Department proposes comprehensive amendment to R.61-64. General areas of this revision include, but are not limited to, clarifying and simplifying the regulation, adding new definitions as required, deleting requirements that are no longer applicable, and to ensure the regulation is in alignment with the current statute. The Department may also amend requirements regarding registration, inspections, violations, enforcement, equipment, and mammography. The proposed amendments will also update vendor classes, add requirements for personnel security screening systems using x-ray, and clarify, organize, and update the radiation safety officer requirements. The Department may also include changes such as corrections for readability, grammar, punctuation, codification, and other such regulatory text improvements.
